The Isalde History of His Withdrawal from Bucklanas's Cabinet.

Philadelphia, Sept. 10.—The Fress this morning prints a seven-column stitle, giving Judge Black's posthumous reply to Jefferson Davis' recent aliack upon him. It comes in the shape of an interview with the great jurist by Frank A. Burr, of the Fress staff, a personal triend of Judge Black, and had just before the judge was taken side. 


